Study people, their relationships and their impact on the world and prepare for career opportunities that encompass intervention, prevention and regulatory services. The program offers psychological theory and undergraduate research opportunities. With several degree specializations and 21 credits of customizable coursework, you can choose a personalized professional path leading to a career with non-profits, community organizations, family life education groups, child protective services, skilled nursing or assisted living facilities and child care programs. You can also use your study of people and relationships as a strong foundation for graduate and professional study in medicine, allied healthcare, law, counseling, research and social work.
