Whether in a school or Extension setting, you can make a difference as a Family and Consumer Sciences educator through instruction focused on critical knowledge and skills needed in relationships, personal development, parenting, infant and childhood development, personal finance management, nutrition, food preparation, interior design, apparel choices, work and family balance and general professional skills. Family and Consumer Sciences teachers are employed in secondary schools, where they also serve as advisors to the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) student leadership organization. County Extension educators also deliver Family and Consumer Sciences content in informal settings to adults and youth through Cooperative Extension Service programs and 4-H.
